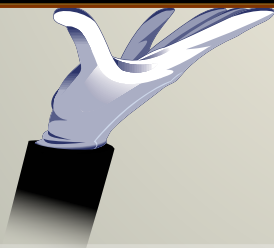

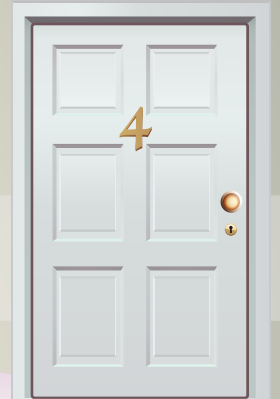


Be polite to people who serve.

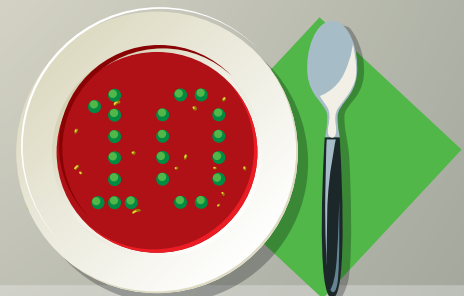
